## GENERAL EDITORIAL REQUIREMENTS THAT AUTHORS SHOULD COMPLY WITH

The article should have an abstract of not more than 250 words. All references (footnotes) must be in accordance with the Oxford Standard for the Citation of Legal Authorities (OSCOLA), which is the citation format of the Africa Journal of Comparative Constitutional (AJCCL). Articles should be in conformity with the citation style prescribed in the Oxford University Standard for the Citation of Legal Authorities (OSCOLA). The 2006 edition of OSCOLA has citation guidelines for international instruments (such as treaties, resolutions adopted under the United Nations and decisions of the International Court of Justice) while the 2012 version is an updated guide for other authorities (such as books, book chapters and journals) and has general information on format and cross referencing. Every international instrument (treaties, resolutions, reports *etc*) cited must have a citation/reference of its source, in every instance that it is referred to. Only the United Nations Charter and the Statute of the International Court of Justice are exempt from the requirement. As is the common practice, only the first footnote citation/reference is in full. Subsequent citations/reference of the same international instrument should be in the form of cross references, in accordance with OSCOLA guidelines.

Every case in an international or municipal court or tribunal cited must have a citation/reference of its source, in every instance that it is referred to. As is the common practice, only the first footnote citation/reference is in full. Subsequent citations/reference of the same case should be in the form of cross references.

Kindly carry out comprehensive editing of the article to eliminate typographical and grammatical errors. Sentences should be as short as possible, in order to prevent the issues being discussed from becoming convoluted. Avoid extremely long sentences, especially those that are above four lines. This includes lengthy sentences that contain colons and semi colons.

Failure to comply with referencing guidelines or excessive editorial and typographical errors **may lead to a rejection of publication** of your article.
