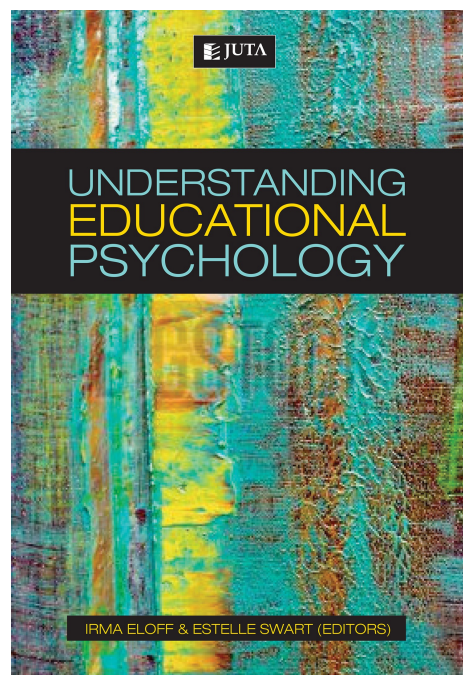


Understanding Educational Psychology
