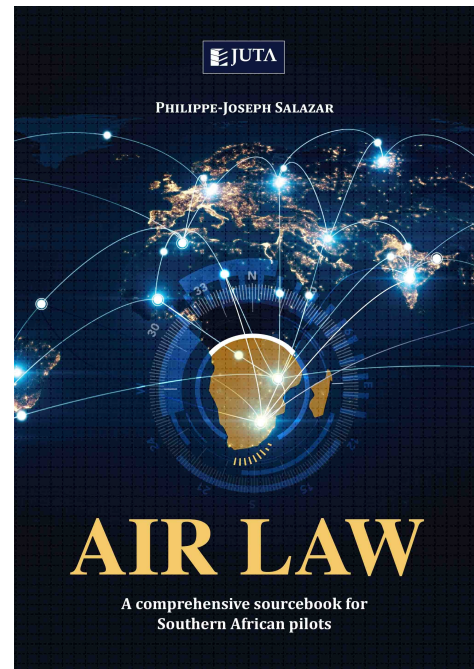


Air Law
